

Dr. Wayne E. Lee

Wayne E. Lee is the Dowd Distinguished Professor of History at the University of North Carolina, where he also chairs the Curriculum in Peace, War, and Defense. He is the author of *Waging War: Conflict, Culture, and Innovation in World History* (2016), *Barbarians and Brothers: Anglo-American Warfare, 1500-1865* (2011), and *Crowds and Soldiers in Revolutionary North Carolina* (2001), as well as two edited volumes on world military history (both 2011) and many articles and book chapters. He has an additional career as an archaeologist, having done field work in Greece, Albania, Hungary, Croatia, and Virginia, including co-directing two field projects. He was a principal author and a co-editor of *Light and Shadow: Isolation and Interaction in the Shala Valley of Northern Albania*, winner of the 2014 Society for American Archaeology's book award. He has just finished a year as the Harold K. Johnson Visiting Professor of Military History at the U.S. Army War College. Prior to graduate school, Dr. Lee served in the U.S. Army as a combat engineer.
